

# MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRMAN

Mustapha representing government. We would also like to thank Bijan Sharafkani and Bob Green for their contributions to LAPELS over the past six plus years.

Rep. Bryant Hammett has introduced legislation, at the request of LES, in HB284 to change the terms of the LAPELS board members appointment from August 31 to March 1. This is to alleviate the problem of board members being appointed by one administration and the next administration not submitting that appointee to the Senate for confirmation. There are a number of other issues that are to be considered in this bill by the legislature.

There have been some questions recently about structural engineering registration in Louisiana. This is a very complex question but I will attempt to clarify where we are at this time in Louisiana.

In Louisiana, since 2002 we register

all Engineers as Professional Engineers and list them in a particular discipline i.e. Structural, Civil, Mechanical, Electrical, etc.

- You can practice and stamp drawings in the discipline you are qualified.
- To be listed in the discipline of Structural in Louisiana you must have passed the NCEES Structural I and Structural II exams. If you have only passed the Structural I exam, you will be listed as Civil.
- At this time, none of our local or state wide permitting offices recognize structural engineering. Only Civil is mentioned.

Some states are now requiring a Structural III exam. I am sure the LAPELS Board will have much more discussion in future years about requirements in Louisiana, especially with the hurricanes in the southern part of the state and the



# FROM THE EXECUTIVE SECRETARY

fter four months on the job and two board meetings behind me, I am feeling more settled.

In March I visited Rosemary Brister, my counterpart at the Mississippi Board of Registration. We share many of the same issues related to the aftermath of the hurricane: an increase in comity and temporary permit applications as well as an increase in enforcement and investigation issues related to unlicensed practice. # **GOVERNOR APPOINTS NEW BOARD MEMBERS**

overnor Blanco has appointed Mark H. Segura, P.E. to the Louisiana Professional Engineering and Land Surveying Board effective Jan. 27, 2006. He will serve the board for a term of six years.

Mr. Segura was born in New Iberia, La. on November 26, 1958 and graduated from Catholic High School in 1976. Mr. Segura received a Bachelor of Science degree in Electrical Engineering (magna cum laude) from the University of Louisiana at Lafayette in December 1984. Mr. Mustapha started his career as a Project Engineer with Summerlin Associates, a civil engineering consulting firm, in Little Rock, Arkansas. In 1988, he joined the Little Rock Wastewater Utility as a Staff Engineer, where he assisted in establishing the Inflow/Infiltration assessment program and the sanitary sewer collection system infrastructure rehabilitation program. In 1990, Mr. Mustapha moved to Shreveport where he was appointed as the City's Drainage Engineer/Storm water & Floodplain Administrator. While working for the city, Mr. Mustapha was instrumental in creating programs to reduce flooding and improve drainage. # DID YOU KNOW?

Robert E. Eddleman, Deputy Executive Secretary/Director of Enforcement

he Louisiana Revised Statutes require firms, as well as individual practitioners, to be licensed with the Board. The only exception is for unincorporated sole proprietorships which operate under the full name by which the individual owner is licensed. All corporations, limited liability companies, partnerships, etc. must file an application and be approved for licensure by the Board prior to offering or providing any engineering or land surveying services within Louisiana. This requirement extends to all businesses which operate a firm offering or providing engineering or land surveying in the State of Louisiana, regardless of the location of the business. Information and applications forms may be obtained by contacting the Board office. Unlicensed firms offering or providing engineering or land surveying services in Louisiana are, among other things, subject to fines of up to \$5,000 per violation.

#### DISCIPLINARY AND ENFORCEMENT ACTIONS

**Practice Of Engineering And/or Land Surveying On An Expired License** 

Mr. David C. Flettrich, P.E., a Louisiana licensee, was disciplined by the Board for the offering and/or providing of engineering services in Louisiana during the period his license was in an expired status from October 1, 2002 until January 28, 2005. Mr. Flettrich's license has been renewed and he has entered into a Consent Order with the Board wherein he agreed to pay a fine of \$100.00, to pay administrative costs of \$250.00, to successfully complete the Board's online Laws and Rrules examination and the Board's online Ethics presentation and examination within sixty days of the effective date of the Consent Order, and to the printing a summary of this matter by name in this publication.

Mr. Eric S. Duck, P.E., a Louisiana licensee, was disciplined by the Board for the offering and/or providing of engineering services in Louisiana during the period his license was in an expired status from April 1, 2004 until June 29, 2005. Mr. Duck's license has been renewed and he has entered into a Consent Order with the Board wherein he agreed to pay a fine of \$250.00, to pay administrative costs of \$100.00, to successfully complete the Board's online Laws and Rules examination within sixty days of the effective date of the Consent Order, to immediately provide written notice to each

person or client for whom he provided engineering services during the period that his license was expired, to simultaneously provide written proof of

each such notice to the Board, and to the printing of a summary of this matter by name in this publication.

Jolly Consultants, Inc., a Louisiana licensed engineering firm, was disciplined by the Board for the offering and/or providing of engineering services in Louisiana during the period that the firm's license was in an expired status from April 1, 1990 until June 28, 2005. The firms' license has been renewed and it has entered into a Consent Order with the Board wherein the firm agreed to pay a fine of \$1,062.00, to pay administrative costs of \$1,212.00, and to the printing of a summary of this matter by name in this publication.

Jeffery M. Moody, P.L.S., a Louisiana licensee, was disciplined by the Board after he disclosed to the Board the unintentional violation of the Board's statutes regarding the practice and/or the offering of land surveying services in Louisiana with an expired license (from April 1, 2005 until November 2, 2005). Mr. Moody's license has been renewed and he has entered into a Consent Order with the Board wherein he agreed to pay a fine of \$100.00, to pay administrative costs of \$217.00, and to the printing of a summary of this matter by name in this publication.

# UNLICENSED OFFER AND/OR PRACTICE OF ENGINEERING AND/OR LAND SURVEYING

A non-licensee was disciplined by the Board for the unlicensed practice of engineering in Louisiana. Dr. Anderson, who is not licensed by the Board, described his business and services as performing "engineering analysis" in a letter to a governmental official. The non-licensee has entered into a Consent Order with the Board wherein he agreed to pay a fine of \$250.00, to pay administrative costs of \$168.23, to immediately cease and desist the use of the words "engineering analysis" or similar words in describing his business services, and to the printing of a summary of this matter without name in this publication.

PE Consultants, Inc., a Texas firm which is not licensed in Louisiana, was disciplined by the Board for the unlicensed practice of engineering in Louisiana. One of PE Consultants, Inc.'s licensed employees practiced engineering and/or signed and sealed engineering reports its behalf in Louisiana. PE Consultants, Inc. has entered into a Consent Order with the Board wherein the firm agreed to pay a fine of \$500.00, to pay administrative costs of \$180.93, to cease and desist the offering and/or providing of engineering services in Louisiana until it can fully comply with the Board's requirements for firm licensure, and to the printing a summary of this matter by name in this publication.

#### FAILURE TO MEET FIRM LICENSURE REQUIREMENTS

Geotechnical Testing Laboratory, Inc., a Louisiana licensed engineering firm, was disciplined by the Board for violating the supervising professional requirements for licensed firms. Geotechnical Testing Laboratory, Inc. provided or offered to provide engineering services in Louisiana at a time when its listed supervising professional was not an employee of the firm. 
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
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
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
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
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#### **ELECTION IS ANNOUNCED**

# CERTIFICATE OF MERIT LEGISLATION BITES THE DUST

(This legislative report is based on actions in the legislature as of the date of this writing, April 19, 2006)

After going a 40-minute round with the House Civil Law and Procedure Committee, Representative Ronnie Johns, Sulphur, LA, the author of HB 398, and ACEC/L's Executive Director, Warren J. Wilder, were handed a verdict of "deferral" on the bill, which means the bill is dead for this session. HB 398, ACEC/L's Certificate of Merit bill, sought to require a plaintiff's attorney to attach to a complaint against a design

professional an affidavit by a third-party design professional retained by the plaintiff's attorney attesting to the facts of the complaint and affirming the validity or non-validity of

the complaint. The reasoning behind the bill is that ACEC/L felt that the affidavit would "crystallize," or more clearly specify the complaint and, thereby, lessen the likelihood of "shotgun," or frivolous litigation.

However, the resounding feeling of the House committee members was that ACEC/L was attempting to "put the cart before the horse," by not allowing for an ample discovery period. Some expressed their opinions that the bill was but a stumbling block in the judiciary process. Others felt that the third-party design professional would be placed in a precarious position of great liability since that person would be required to stamp the report with his professional seal. Rep. Ernie Alexander, Lafayette, LA, suggested that it may be more appropriate to have a third-party group of professionals tender the affidavit instead of an individual. Ruston's representative, Richard Gallot, and others continued to press home the point that HB 398 would hinder the investigation of the plaintiff attorney to "arrive at the truth."

Opposing the bill, a Baton Rouge attorney, representing the Louisiana Trial Lawyers' Association, pointed out that in 1996, the Louisiana Legislature enacted laws that changed the aspects of liability of various litigants to Comparative Negligence, whereby the judge, after listening to both camps involved in litigation and based on the evidence presented, would assign various percentages of liability to the losing parties which would equate to the amount of damages each non-prevailing party would have to pay the aggrieved litigant. The comparative negligence was ultimately the "kiss of death" for HB 398.

HB 960 by Representative Bryant Hammett, Ferriday, LA, which would declare as policy that there be no bidding for professional services in Louisiana, has not been scheduled for a House committee hearing as of the date of this writing. The bill states that no costs or cost-related data will be used as a criterion in the selection of design professionals. Design professional fees and the anticipated construction budget may still be advertised with a definitive scope of services as is the practice of the State's Facility Planning and Control and the Louisiana Department of Transportation and Development, since the figures are not used in the selection process. This point will be spelled out in an amendment to the bill.

HB 826 by Houma representative, Damon Baldone, spells out a Qualifications-Based Selection procedure, re-affirming the state procurement code, BUT after a short list of the three topmost qualified firms is developed by a using agency selection committee, these three firms would be required to submit a bid with the contract being awarded to the lowest bidder! WOW! ACEC/L will oppose this bill. If QBS is the state

selection procedure by law (and it is, Act 721), then the most qualified design professional should be awarded the contract, not awarded to the lowest bidder!

SB 232 and SB 623 by Senator Mike Smith, Winnfield, LA, seeks to assign ranges for engineering fees in connection with the design of rural water systems. Fees for projects not requiring surveying or on-site inspections shall be in the range of 5 to 7%. Fee for projects requiring those services shall be in the range of 8 to 10%. This is about half of what the fee would normally be. Smith feels that some of his constituents are being gouged with high fees on small and simple projects. ACEC/L will oppose. (By the way, this is the first time that I can remember where a legislator introduces the same bill TWICE in the same chamber!).

HB 159 by Representative Billy Montgomery, Haughton, LA, seeks to raise the current \$125,000 threshold under which a non-licensed person may act as a designer on certain architectural projects to \$385,000! The bill was heard on the House side and cleared the House floor with an amendment decreasing the proposed increase to \$250,000. As of 04/18/06, the bill is awaiting a senate committee hearing. While this is an architect's bill, ACEC/L has taken a posture of opposition on a low key since this bill apparently does not protect the general public. Let's face it. I would not want a non-licensed intern fresh out of medical school having the authority to perform "minor surgeries," such as appendectomies and tonsillectomies!

HB 1087 by Shreveport representative, Cedric Glover, would authorize municipal governmental plan reviewers or the State Fire Marshal's Office to review plans and specs to assure compliance to the various rules, laws and life safety codes. Currently, this is the responsibility of the Fire Marshal's Office. This could open the door for possibly less qualified people to review plans. We feel "if it ain't broke, don't fix it!" It appears to this organization that the current system is working.

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
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# FOR GOOD MEASURE


